



Natural areas Ajanta - A Masterpiece in rock

Mumbai, 12 February: The Ajanta Caves, situated in the Deccan in Maharashtra and about 110 km from Aurangabad, are a UNESCO World Heritage Site. A visit to the place reveals a large slice of history

These rock-cut cave temples and monasteries of Buddhism date back to around 2nd century BCE. Since they were in the jungles, cut into a mountainside, the external world did not know about them for a long time. They were discovered only in the 19th century: The caves include paintings and rock-cut sculptures described as among the finest surviving examples of ancient Indian art. The paintings are expressive and present emotion through gesture, pose, and form. According to UNESCO, these are masterpieces of Buddhist religious art that influenced the Indian art that followed.

Two new visitor centers provide extensive information about the heritage site using audiovisual media. Local staff is employed for security purposes. Though photography is allowed at certain places, with fees for the use of a camera, the use of tripods and flash is prohibited. Sign Boards and brochures/leaflets provide information about the care to be taken to preserve this UNESCO protected heritage site. "The caves are now being looked after by a private company under the Indian government's 'Adopt a Heritage Site' program." said a senior official.

The future generations must know about their history and culture, For this purpose, steps have to be taken to preserve these sites, First and foremost, trespassing by either humans or animals should be strictly prohibited. Access to these sites for tourists, vendors, officials, and the general public should be restricted or monitored carefully. 



Coorg lies in Karnataka - South India, about 252 km from Bangalore. One can reach there by rail or road or by air up to Bangalore and then one can travel by car to Mysore. From Mysore, it is a 120 km drive to Coorg.

Coorg is termed as 'The Scotland of India' and The 'Kashmir of Karnataka.'

(ii) Accommodation facilities (Stay/board/lodge)

There are many resorts like 'Misty woods Resort', 'Cliff Resort' etc and many 5 Star and 3 stars hotels, but the best and the cheapest option is 'Homestay', The local people, let out rooms to tourist with food and accommodation at reasonable rates.

(iii) What to see and visit? Attractions of the place?

One can book a car and see the beautiful places in Coorg like The Rajas seat, Mandalpatti View Point, Bylakuppe, Iruppu falls, Abbey falls, Chettalli, and the beautiful wildlife places like Nisargadhama and The Nagarhole National Park.

This place is famous for its scenic beauty, waterfalls, etc.

(iv) Places of interest nearby?

Nearby is Mysore, Which is famous for its palace and The Brindavan gardens, which are lit up for The 'Dassera Festival'.

(v) Best time to visit:-

Coorg can be visited at any time of the year, but The best season to visit is between October and May. It enjoys tropical weather.

(vi) Shopping Attractions:

One can shop for honey, coffee, cardamom, and other spices.

(vii) Personal observations:-

The tribal life and culture of this place are unique. Its food is rich and spicy and the Coorg women are supposed to be the most beautiful women in our country. They have a unique way of dressing up their sarees. The people of this region do not sell their land to outsiders. They want to preserve their culture, beauty, and tradition.

Subject: Protection of Rivers

Sir,

I wish to draw your attention to the popular 'Rally for Rivers' movement which plans to clean up some of the rivers which are polluted. The campaign led by the spiritual guru of the Isha Foundation aims at planting six crore saplings on the banks of the Narmada river July this year.

At this point, I have a few doubts and concerns, which I plan to share with you. Does this project think about the sand mining mafia, pollution, deforestation, and river inter-linking? The concept that they seem to be after is mainly planting of trees. What about cleaning the rivers?

I feel that rivers may gain when trees help rainwater seep into the soil, but that requires planning and control of groundwater usage as well. Ban on borewells can also help in the storage of underground water. Water budgeting can calculate groundwater that is replenished and used.

The Rally for rivers seems to be going in the other direction by suggesting to plant fruit trees. It needs to broaden its vision and include other factors also. With such a narrow vision, It may end up with what it begins with.
