Explanation: Bholi's groom Bishamber was a greedy old man. To compensate for Bholi's pock-marked face, he demanded a dowry of rupees five thousand. Thus, Bholi

- decided to refuse to get married to him. Hence, (b) is the right answer.

Explanation: The term 'contemplating' means 'to think or ponder about something deeply'. Here, option (c) represents the same meaning of the word 'contemplating'. Hence, (c) is the right answer.

(D) (d) She had faith in Bholi standing up for herself.

Explanation: Bholi's teacher was there at the wedding and she viewed the entire scenario with her eyes. She was proud of Bholi taking stand for herself. She looked at Bholi with "a deep satisfaction that an artist feels when contemplating the completion of her masterpiece." Hence, (d) is the right answer.


