So Jim told Della that they should keep their gifts away as they were too nice to be used in the present. Although Jim and Della were left with gifts too nice to be used but they were not sad as they could realise their love for each other. They demonstrated their love for each other by sacrificing their greatest possession.

(k) But in a last word to the wise of these days let it be said that of all who give gifts these two were the wisest. Of all who give and receive gifts, such as they are wisest. Everywhere they are wisest they are the magi.

Ans: The above lines have been quoted from "The Gift of the Magi" one of the most popular stories written by O'Henry. Here the author has considered Jim and Della's gift wisest and compares their gift to the Magi who were Biblical characters.

As per author Jim and Della both sacrified their most prized possession to buy so something for use with the other's most cherished possession Both behaved impulsively, sacrificing their greatest treasure without thinking about the consequences and thinking only of making one another happy. As per author all those persons who give and receives gifts like Jim and Della are wisest in the whole world.

The value of gift lies not in its monetary price but in the intent, sacrifice and generosity behind the giving. They are like Magi, the three wise men from Christian mythology who carried previous gifts to Christ at his birth Jim and Della's gifts were gifts of love and sacrifice. It also deals with what constitutes the true spirit of gift giving on Christmas.
