

(B) Degrees of Comparison of Adjectives.

Read the sentences.

- (1) Yatin is strong.
- (2) Amit is stronger than Yatin.
- (3) Pravin is the strongest of all.

In sentence (1) the Adjective 'strong' is in its simple form. It is called *Positive Degree*.

In sentence (2) the Adjective 'stronger' refers to a higher degree, when there is a comparison of two nouns. It is called Comparative Degree. (-er is added to the basic Adjective)

In sentence (3) the adjective 'strongest' refers to the highest degree of comparison of one with more than two nouns. It is called Superlative.

Degree. (-est is added to the basic Adjective)
