

 $(a,b)R(c,d) \Leftrightarrow ad = bc$ for all $(a,b),(c,d) \in \mathbb{N} \times \mathbb{N}$. Show that R is an equivalence relation on

In an Office three employees James, Sophia and Oliver process incoming copies of a certain form. James processes 50% of the forms, Sophia processes 20% and Oliver the remaining 30% of the forms. James has an error rate of 0.06, Sophia has an error rate of 0.04 and Oliver has an error rate of 0.03.

Based on the above information, answer the following questions.



- (i) Find the probability that Sophia processed the form and committed an error.
- (ii) Find the total probability of committing an error in processing the form.
- (iii) The manager of the Company wants to do a quality check. During inspection, he selects a form at random from the days output of processed form. If the form selected at random has an error, find the probability that the form is **not** processed by James.

OR

(iii) Let E be the event of committing an error in processing the form and let E_1, E_2 and E_3 be the events that James, Sophia and Oliver processed the form. Find the value of $\sum_{i=1}^{3} P(E_i|E)$.



Team C pulls with force $F_3 = -3\hat{i} - 3\hat{j} kN$,

- (ii) Which team will win the game?
- (iii) Find the magnitude of the resultant force exerted by the teams.

The relation between the height of the plant ('y' in cm) with respect to its exposure to the sunlight is governed by the following equation $y = 4x - \frac{1}{2}x^2$, where 'x' is the number of days exposed to the sunlight, for $x \le 3$.



- (i) Find the rate of growth of the plant with respect to the number of days exposed to the sunlight.
- (ii) Does the rate of growth of the plant increase or decrease in the first three days? What will be the height of the plant after 2 days?







$$\frac{x-0}{1} = \frac{y-1}{2} = \frac{z-2}{3} = \lambda; \lambda \text{ is a scalar, i.e., } x = \lambda, y = 2\lambda + 1 \text{ and } z = 3\lambda + 2$$

Let the coordinates of L be $(\lambda, 2\lambda + 1, 3\lambda + 2)$.

So, direction ratios of **PL** are $\lambda - 1, 2\lambda + 1 - 6$ and $3\lambda + 2 - 3$, *i.e.* $\lambda - 1, 2\lambda - 5$ and $3\lambda - 1$.

Direction ratios of the given line are 1,2 and 3, which is perpendicular to PL.

Therefore,
$$(\lambda - 1)1 + (2\lambda - 5)2 + (3\lambda - 1)3 = 0 \Rightarrow 14\lambda - 14 = 0 \Rightarrow \lambda = 1$$

So, coordinates of L are (1,3,5).


Let $Q(x_1, y_1, z_1)$ be the image of P(1,6,3) in the given line. Then, L is the mid-point of PQ.

Therefore, $\frac{(x_1+1)}{2} = 1$, $\frac{(y_1+6)}{2} = 3$ and $\frac{(z_1+3)}{2} = 5 \Rightarrow x_1 = 1$, $y_1 = 0$ and $z_1 = 7$

Hence, the image of P(1,6,3) in the given line is (1,0,7).

Now, the distance of the point (1,0,7) from the y – axis is $\sqrt{1^2+7^2} = \sqrt{50}$ units.

Given that equation of lines are

$$\vec{r} = \lambda (\hat{i} - \hat{j} + \hat{k})$$
.....(i) and $\vec{r} = \hat{i} - \hat{j} + \mu (-2\hat{j} + \hat{k})$(ii)

The given lines are non-parallel lines as vectors $\hat{i} - \hat{j} + \hat{k}$ and $-2\hat{j} + \hat{k}$ are not parallel. There is a unique line segment PQ(P) lying on line (i) and Q on the other line (ii), which is at right angles to both the lines. PQ is the shortest distance between the lines. Hence, the shortest possible

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Let the position vector of the point P lying on the line $\vec{r} = \lambda (\hat{i} - \hat{j} + \hat{k})$ where ' λ ' is a scalar, is

 $\lambda(\hat{i}-\hat{j}+\hat{k})$, for some λ and the position vector of the point Q lying on the line

$$\vec{r} = \hat{i} - \hat{j} + \mu \left(-2\hat{j} + \hat{k}\right)$$
; where ' μ ' is a scalar, is $\hat{i} + \left(-1 - 2\mu\right)\hat{j} + \left(\mu\right)\hat{k}$, for some μ .

Now, the vector $\overrightarrow{PQ} = \overrightarrow{OQ} - \overrightarrow{OP} = (1 - \lambda)\hat{i} + (-1 - 2\mu + \lambda)\hat{j} + (\mu - \lambda)\hat{k}$; (where 'O' is the

origin), is perpendicular to both the lines, so the vector \overrightarrow{PQ} is perpendicular to both the vectors $\hat{i} - \hat{i} + \hat{k}$ and $-2\hat{i} + \hat{k}$.

$$\Rightarrow (1-\lambda).1 + (-1-2\mu+\lambda).(-1) + (\mu-\lambda).1 = 0 \&$$

$$\Rightarrow (1-\lambda).0 + (-1-2\mu+\lambda).(-2) + (\mu-\lambda).1 = 0$$



The lines are not parallel as direction ratios are not proportional. Let P be a point on straight line

(i) and Q be a point on straight line (ii) such that line PQ is perpendicular to both of the lines.

Let the coordinates of P be $(\lambda, -\lambda, \lambda)$ and that of Q be $(1, -2\mu - 1, \mu)$; where ' λ ' and ' μ ' are

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scalars.	
Then the direction ratios of the line PQ are $(\lambda-1,-\lambda+2\mu+1,\lambda-\mu)$	
Since PQ is perpendicular to straight line (i) , we have,	
$(\lambda - 1).1 + (-\lambda + 2\mu + 1).(-1) + (\lambda - \mu).1 = 0$	
$\Rightarrow 3\lambda - 3\mu = 2(iii)$	
Since, PQ is perpendicular to straight line (\ddot{u}) , we have	
$0.(\lambda - 1) + (-\lambda + 2\mu + 1).(-2) + (\lambda - \mu).1 = 0 \Rightarrow 3\lambda - 5\mu = 2(i\nu)$	
Solving (iii) and (iv), we get $\mu = 0, \lambda = \frac{2}{3}$	
Therfore , the Coordinates of P are $\left(\frac{2}{3}, -\frac{2}{3}, \frac{2}{3}\right)$ and that of Q are $\left(1, -1, 0\right)$	
So, the required shortest distance is $\sqrt{\left(1-\frac{2}{3}\right)^2+\left(-1+\frac{2}{3}\right)^2+\left(0-\frac{2}{3}\right)^2}=\sqrt{\frac{2}{3}}$ units.	

Section -E

This section comprises solution of 3 case-study/passage based questions of 4 marks each with two sub parts. Solution of the first two case study questions have three sub parts (i),(ii),(iii) of marks 1,1,2 respectively. Solution of the third case study question has two sub parts of 2 marks each.)

Let E_1, E_2, E_3 be the events that James, Sophia and Oliver processed the form, which are clearly 36 pairwise mutually exclusive and exhaustive set of events.

Then
$$P(E_1) = \frac{50}{100} = \frac{5}{10}$$
, $P(E_2) = \frac{20}{100} = \frac{1}{5}$ and $P(E_3) = \frac{30}{100} = \frac{3}{10}$.

Also, let E be the event of committing an error.

We have,
$$P(E \mid E_1) = 0.06$$
, $P(E \mid E_2) = 0.04$, $P(E \mid E_3) = 0.03$.

(i) The probability that Sophia processed the form and committed an error is given by

$$P(E \cap E_2) = P(E_2).P(E \mid E_2) = \frac{1}{5} \times 0.04 = 0.008.$$

(ii) The total probability of committing an error in processing the form is given by

$$P(E) = P(E_1).P(E \mid E_1) + P(E_2).P(E \mid E_2) + P(E_3).P(E \mid E_3)$$

$$P(E) = \frac{50}{100} \times 0.06 + \frac{20}{100} \times 0.04 + \frac{30}{100} \times 0.03 = 0.047.$$

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$$P(E_1 | E) = \frac{P(E | E_1) \times P(E_1)}{P(E | E_1) \cdot P(E_1) + P(E | E_2) \cdot P(E_2) + P(E | E_3) \cdot P(E_3)}$$

$$=\frac{0.06\times\frac{50}{100}}{0.06\times\frac{50}{100}+0.04\times\frac{20}{100}+0.03\times\frac{30}{100}}=\frac{30}{47}$$

Therefore, the required probability that the form is **not** processed by James given that form has an

error =
$$P(\overline{E_1} | E) = 1 - P(E_1 | E) = 1 - \frac{30}{47} = \frac{17}{47}$$

$$= \frac{P(E \cap (E_{1} \cup E_{2} \cup E_{3}))}{P(E)} = \frac{P(E \cap S)}{P(E)} = \frac{P(E)}{P(E)} = 1; 'S' \text{ being the sample space}$$

We have,

$$\left| \overrightarrow{F_1} \right| = \sqrt{6^2 + 0^2} = 6 kN, \left| \overrightarrow{F_2} \right| = \sqrt{\left(-4 \right)^2 + 4^2} = \sqrt{32} = 4\sqrt{2} kN, \left| \overrightarrow{F_3} \right| = \sqrt{\left(-3 \right)^2 + \left(-3 \right)^2} = \sqrt{18} = 3\sqrt{2} kN.$$
