but his passionate love of 'the underdog and his antipathy to caste though not unprecedented ancient India, were unorthodox in the extreme, and owed more to European 19th Century liberalism than to anything Indian. His faith in non-violence was, as we have seen, by no means typical of Hinduism his predecessor in revolt, the able Maratha Brahman B. G. Tilak and impatient Gandhi's lieutenant Subhash Chndra Bose, were far more orthodox in this respect. For Gandhi's pacifism we must look to the Sermon on the Mount and to Tolstoy. \
