

# **Paraphrase**

The poet is seated in the front of her house watching the evening scene before her. The sun is setting. Twilight has set in; daylight is fading fast as night falls upon the earth. Working hours are almost over, but in the dimness of dusk, she sees a farmer still among his fields. She describes him as old and poor, patiently surveying the land around him. She feels respect for the peasant.

His figure is dark against the evening skies and towers over the ploughed soil. He is ready for the task at hand.

He is going to sow the seeds, which, sometime in the future, he will harvest. The old farmer walks up and down scattering the seeds methodically under the darkening sky. The poet, deep in thought watches him. He is a noble and impressive figure. He seems to touch the starry sky from where she is watching.

Ans. The poet observes that the old farmer is still at work even at dusk. He does not end his work just because it is twilight, or because other workers have gone home. She feels wonder and respect ('I feel a thrill') at his tall shape, alone in the field, looking over his land. He dutifully plods up and down, sowing. She is lost in thought ('Muse I'). She is impressed at his hard work, for he works alone in order that many other people can also eat.

# (A3) The poet is prompted to call the sower an 'august personality', which means one who has reached the highest position in his workplace. Explain this using the following points.

## • Hard work

**Ans.** The farmer has to labour, every day from sun up to sundown, preparing the land, sowing, weeding, fertilizing, irrigating, keeping away pests, poachers, stray animals and constantly fearing bad weather. He has to pray for rain and sun at the right stage for his fields of crops, and, if all goes well he can harvest it. He must again get a good price for his hard work to make a livelihood. There are so many things that could go wrong in spite of his back-breaking toils.

### Perseverance

**Ans.** The farmer, has to face many adversities. Too much rain or too little, wild winds or animals, sickness of the plants or his family, are all threats. There is the never ending attention and work demanded by the crops in the fields. All this requires enormous determination. He perseveres even then, tending to the land so that his harvest will feed not only his family, but his fellowmen too. The inner

courage to face the difficulties and the determination to do hard labour shows the farmer's perseverance.

### Dedication

Ans. Only the farmer who is dedicated to work on his beloved land can face the multiple challenges. He must love the land and the hard work and harvest is his reward. For an onlooker it might be frightening to think of so many things that could cause ruin. It is easier to leave this to 'someone else' and buy the supply of food we need. But only the dedicated son of the earth will give his sweat and blood to nurture the earth, season after season, year after year.

**Ans.** Toru Dutt's translation of Victor Hugo's poem is in praise of a farmer

working by himself to sow the seeds after sundown. The twenty line poem is not divided into stanzas, and the rhyme scheme is ab, ab, cd, cd and so on. The theme centres on the lone farmer continuing to toil even in the half-darkness with quiet determination. The poem is set around sunset, which is described variously as 'Sunlight dying fast,' 'Twilight hastens,' Shadows', Darkness deepens,' 'starry skies'. The farmer is described as 'Old', 'in rags', 'patient', 'his silhouette dominates', 'Marches along', and his 'august gestures'.

Poetic devices like alliteration, imagery and hyperbole add the tone of the poet's respect and admiration for the farmer's toil. The words 'his gestures are august' and 'his height seems to touch the skies', 'strides'. 'Marches' are in contrast to the figure being 'old, in rags'. This emphasizes how in spite of his poverty he is a commanding figure. Toru Dutt succeeds in making the reader to imagine the old farmer with reverence for his single-handed toil in the darkness.

Ans. The title is what the whole poem is about - the Farmer sowing his fields. The poet is observing the lone figure in the half darkness which is fast turning to night. He is old and poorly clad in rags, yet she admires him for his dignity. The personality of the honest and hard-working has a quiet air of confidence, fearlessness, and independence. Toru Dutt captures these beautifully in her description by the language used. Her deep respect and admiration for the simple, hard working farmer is felt by the reader also. The poem is simple in form and language, but the message is deep and can be felt by the reader also.
