

3.6 The art of Compering

Ice Breakers

(1) Anchoring:

(Points: has different meanings)

- (1) securing something firmly;
- (2) coordinating a flow of events during any event;
- (3) feeling attached or secure.)

(2) Compering:

(Points: acting as a compere.)

- A compere is a person whose job is to introduce performers in a television, radio or stage show. He/She introduces the programme and the participants; he is the mediator, announcer and coordinator between different events in a programme. He is also called 'The Master of Ceremonies' or MC/emcee, or an anchor.

(3) Hosting Programmes:

(Points: (1) receiving or entertaining guests in a social or official capacity at events;


- (2) acting as the compere/anchor for some programme.)

(4) Public Speaking:

(Points also called oratory: (1) a single person speaking to a group;

- (2) giving a speech.)

- Go through the following web that highlights the essential qualities of a compere. Discuss with your partner the essential qualities and also the precautions that a compere should take while compering a programme.



Ans. (1) While compering, always keep in mind the audience for example, if the audience is made up of professors and teachers, the tone and behaviour should be respectful; if it is your classmates, it can be informal.

(2) Prepare well before the event. The compere must know the flow of the programme, the names of the organizers, office-bearers, guests, etc. At no stage should false information or incorrect facts be given; offensive comments should never be made. The correct pronunciation of the names of the people who are to be introduced/ welcomed/mentioned should be checked.

(3) The clothes and body language should be appropriate for the event. Make a study of the situation beforehand and do not offend the sensibilities of anyone. Also, the compering should be accompanied by graceful gestures, but not to be overdone.

(4) Remember that the compere is not the star of the show, but a person who ensures the smooth movement of the programme. Do not forget to introduce yourself, but do not draw all the attention to yourself; if there are mistakes, apologize immediately and proceed

Qualities of a compere for a cultural event :	
→	(1) Good communication skills.
→	(2) Knowledge of the subject.
→	(3) Proper attire.
→	(4) Understanding of the nature and tone of the event.
→	(5) Understanding of the audience, and keeping them interested and responsive.
→	(6) Appropriate body language.
→	(7) Ability to ensure smooth movement of the programme even when there are hurdles.
→	(8) Should have spontaneity, originality and genuineness.

Ans. These are the areas or sectors where comperes are always in great demand: Showbiz or show business, education sector, retail industry, broadcasting sector, hospitality, event management, and catering business.

Given below are the special skills needed to take up compering as a career.

Thorough knowledge and understanding of various kinds of events, good command over language, pleasant personality, good fashion sense, knowledge of grooming, developing, and maintaining contacts with key people in the events industry, documenting testimonials from credible people.

A compere can acquire these skills by working relentlessly in the following ways:

- i. A professional compere should socialise often and focus on building a network of people.
- ii. It is important for a compere to constantly work on his diction and vocabulary.
- iii. A compere should make occasional courtesy calls to industry professionals.
- iv. A professional compere is expected to rehearse and prepare well for an audition.
- v. Social media profiles of a compere should be updated with the latest and relevant work.
- vi. A compere should document pictures and videos from past events and build a portfolio.
- vii. A compere should groom well and maintain a sharp look at all times.
