For Anne Gregory

Introduction

The poem 'For Anne Gregory' has been composed by William Butler Yeats. In the poem, the poet imagines a conversation between himself and the young Anne Gregory.

Summary

Anne Gregory was the granddaughter of Lady Augusta Gregory, who was a dear friend of the poet. The poet observes that Anne's hair is of the same golden colour as honey. He tells her that the way her hair falls over her ear, entirely enveloping it within its strands reminds him of the wide walls around the fort erected for its protection. The poet says

that he is well aware that the sight of her beautiful hair makes many a young man to fall in love with her and he is also sympathetic towards them for the despair that they might feel on being rejected by her. However, he says that young men love her only for her beautiful hair, i.e. because of her external beauty and not because who she is as a person. To this, Anne Gregory replies that if her yellow hair is what men like, then she can easily dye in colours such as brown, black or carrot. These colours, she feels, are less appealing than blonde. Then it might be possible for the young men to look beyond her physical appearance and love her for the person that she is.

To this, the poet replies that the previous night he had been hearing a religious man who said that only God loves a person for who he is.

Message

The poet wants to convey the message that God is our father and it is only he who accepts and loves us in spite of all our follies and appearances.

- Q L What are the things of the woman which make the young man to love her? (CBSE 2016)
- Ans. The young man love Anne Gregory for her honey coloured hair falling on her ears which makes her look very beautiful. This means that the young men give more importance to the physical appearance than inner or spiritual beauty.
- Q 2. The poet in the poem 'For Anne Gregory' conveys beauty as temporary. Explain with reference to the (CBSE 2023) poem.

Q1. Physical beauty is not permanent, but the beauty of character or internal beauty is permanent. Justify on the basis of your reading of 'For Anne Gregory'.

Ans. In the poem 'For Anne Gregory', the poet tells Anne that young men love her only because of her beautiful golden hair. He says that they do not know the person that she is. They are just enthralled by her physical beauty and claim that they love her. So. Anne decides that she would change her physical appearance by dying her hair in black, brown or carrot colour. By doing so, she would look ugly and hence young men who love her only because of her hair would stop doing so. However, the poet feels that this will be ineffectual. He knows that Anne is a truly beautiful person on the inside and that she cannot look ugly, even if she tries hard. So, we can conclude that physical beauty is not permanent but the beauty of character or internal beauty is permanent
