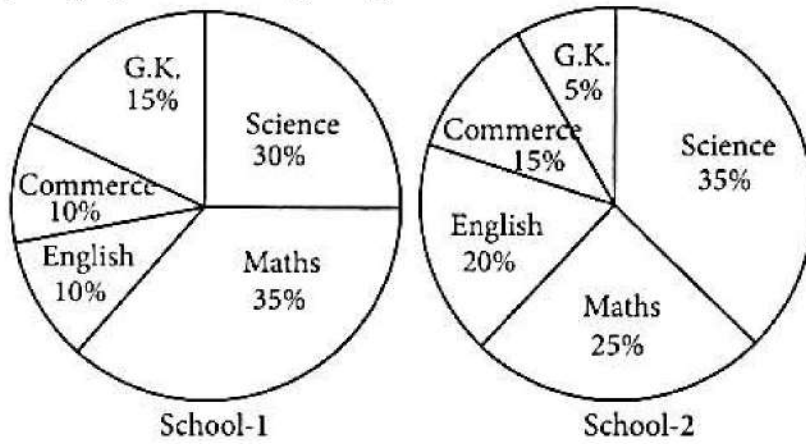

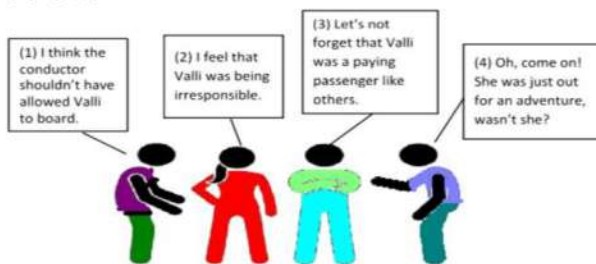

SECTION B – CREATIVE WRITING SKILLS

15. The bar graph illustrates data about the favourite types of movies of students in a school based on the given five genres of movies, i.e., action, comedy, drama, horror and mystery. The highest number of students are interested in mystery as numbered eighty students. Half of the students are interested in drama movies. Around fifty are interested in action movies whereas sixty-five students have shown their interest in comedy. The second highest number i.e., seventy five out of eighty were interested in horror movies. Overall it is clear from the data that most of the students like to watch movies that deal with mysteries whereas the least they like to watch is drama.
