• Are the words spoken by the boys used as they were in sentence 'a' and why? **Answer:**

No, the words spoken by the boys are not used as they were in sentence 'a'. In sentence 'b', the actual words spoken by the boys are not mentioned, rather they are reported.

• Why and when is it essential to make a change of this type?

Answer:

It is essential to change a sentence into indirect speech when we are reporting to a third person about what was said in the past. This change is made to avoid confusion of who said the words and when they were said.
