



1) Forest Officer / Ranger

Ans. To become a forest officer / ranger, one needs to have a bachelor's degree in engineering, medical or science, preferably in forestry or in agriculture. In India, it is mandatory for the candidates to clear the relevant Civil Services Examination for the post of Forest Officer.

2) Wildlife Photographer

Ans. To become a Wildlife Photographer, one needs to clear the 10+2 equivalent examination and pursue a diploma/certificate course in Wildlife Photography. A person having a degree in photography along with relevant field experience can also aspire to become a Wildlife Photographer.

3) Environmentalist

Ans. To become an Environmentalist, one must possess a bachelor's or master's degree in environmental sciences or equivalent.

4) Geologist

Ans. To become a Geologist, one must have atleast a bachelor's degree in Geology. MSC or PhD in Geology can serve as an additional qualification.

5) Tour Manager

Ans. To become a Tour Manager, one must have a diploma or degree in Travel and Tourism Management.
