WE LIVE IN A HUMAN MIND MADE WORLD

Thinking positive is avoiding negative. All happens according to the thoughts created by the mind. It happens are not but we are made to believe or to not believe something that happens.

Lord Buddha said," We live in a mind made world." The main function of mind is to produce thoughts. Poet John Milton said, "The mind is its own place, and in itself can make a heaven of hell and hell of a heaven..." The above aptly describe the tremendous power of mind. However, to most of the common people who do not put in much of efforts to understand how the mind works, it still continues to be the least understood faculty of human soul. It is something one cannot see, touch or measure with any scientific gadgets, yet its effects are felt –through expressions, actions and behaviour. It works nonstop and is an inseparable companion of human being.

Like muscles 'mind' stretches or shrinks respectively depending on how much or how little one makes use of it. It is a common knowledge that knives are used for various purposes. A doctor uses a knife to operate a patient for his/her good, a villain uses a knife to kill or harm his / her victim and a house wife uses a knife for her cooking preparations and as well for other household purposes. Similarly, good and bad are not in human being; they are caused by different thoughts produced by mind. Mind becomes one's best asset when he/she produces good thoughts and nourishes it. It however can turn into his/her worst enemy when he/she lets himself/herself produce damaging thoughts. Like the foundations are responsible for the stability of buildings, the mind is responsible for the stability of human being. Famous West Indian cricketer Sir Vivian Richards while corroborating the above said in his cricketing language, "Batting isn't like a house, where the foundation starts at the bottom and the building progresses upwards. Here the foundation starts at the top. If your mind is doing well, you will do well."

Mind cannot differentiate between negation and affirmation. When one constantly thinks of not doing some particular thing, the mind gets the message of 'doing some particular thing' and tries to bring that into existence. The following Buddhist tale is relevant in the above context. A Buddhist monk went to his master one day and asked for some guidelines to meditate during a period of three days of absence. The master replied, "During these three days you can think of anything other than monkeys." After three days when the disciple went to meet his master, the master asked him about the last three day's experience. The disciple replied, "I cannot understand what happened. All the three days I could not think of anything rather than the monkeys." This is a reality in human life and it explains the failure of many people whose thoughts are concentrated more or what they don't want rather than on what they want. Energy spent in thinking, talking or worrying about what one does not want always keeps that alive. Great philosopher Carl Jung was spot on when he said, "What you desist persists." The solution lies in replacing the thought of what one does not want with thought of what he/she wants.

The short stories as a brief and complete narrative, restricted to a single effect and dealing for this reason with one profile, some particular and revealing aspects of the central character's personality in a single episode, is perhaps a fifteen or sixteenth century phenomenon in Europe. It developed evidently, from stories, woven into regular novels, such as in Cervantes "Don Quixote" and in Alexander Dumas "The Three Musketeers" In the England of Dr. JOHNSON 'S era, the shorts stories technique was applied to tales for teaching moral lesson. Only in the nineteenth century did it begin to acquire the form that is familiars to us today. Perhaps the greatest fraction of the short stories in Europe, and the man who gave it its modern status as an independent and special literary form, was Guy de Maupassant. From France, the form traveled to England and Russia and was immediately adopted in America, Edgar, Allen pope used the shirt stories form for tales of mood and horror as well as for detective stories. O Henry tuned the short stories to humors and wit. It was inevitable that, under the influence of English writing, when the British ruled south Asia, the short form should make its way here.

As in other place in south Asia too, Story – telling is an ancient art older than the "Katha Sarit Sagar" and the "Panchtantra" (volumes of stories and fables). But the short stories in story telling did not develop significantly as an independent form until story telling was yanked into the modern age with the work of Premchand who wrote in Urdu and Hindi. His language might be described most aptly as Hindustani; the trunk from which the personalized refinement branched out into and the Sanskrit's refinement into Hindi. The direction toward the modern's sensibility came from him primarily and the thread was picked up by Ismate Chugtai who came into popular acclaim with her two volumes of short stories, "kalian" and "chotan". Her stories dramatized in character in action the social way wiles and wisdom of man and women of the $1930_{\rm S}$ and the $1940_{\rm S}$; though she continued to

write in the following years and though her work retained its nerve and pointedness, she has been considered essentially as some kind of a bridge between the restrained story writing of Premchand on the one hand and the (some times shockingly) candid and explicit stories of Saadat Hassan Manto and the two most prominent fiction writers spawned by the progressive writers movement, Krishen Chander and Rajinder Singh Singh Bedi.

These three writers, Manto, Krishen Chander and Bedi, lifted the Urdu short story to its most sophisticated level. They have been recently made available to the English – reading public in translation by Mr. Jai Ratan – two volumes of the selected short stories of Krishen Chander and Rajinder Singh Bedi published by the Sahitya academy, New Delhi and a collection of the short stories of Saadat Hassan Manto, "The Best of Manto," published by Starling publisher New Delhi.

Of these three writers, Manto, who died in 1955 at the young age of forty two veered dictionary to the language used by Premchand, Hindustan written in alif-bey but carrying thought and implication that was a great deal more subtle and pointed. However, what Manto known for are his defiance of social convention about what may and may not be publicly stated, and his penchant for depicting scenes and action explicitly. A certain section of the public the middle class orthodox who preferred a gloss of morality and stood resolutely by ossified rites and attitudes –opposed him with all the influence at its command, and he was hauled up a number of times on the charges of obscenity. If there is anything for which one might call him to account, it is that he tends occasionally to be self-consciously unreserved and unrestrained in his picking of themes and in the language in which he expressed himself, for all this, Manto's stories reminiscent in some ways of Maupassant do not make lust, greed and exploitation attractive, though he writes with sympathy for the twilight world of prostitutes and under dogs; his knowledge and understanding of their lines, aspirations and endeavors are obviously authentic Stories such as "Khol De" (translated by Mr. Jai Ratan as 'loosen up') "Toba Take Singh" and "Babu Gopinath" are today almost classics and will continue to stay relevant to the South Asian Predicament for a long time.

It is only the grand daughter Victoria, who is a sole witness to this game of pinching things and benefits. In a lighter tone, Abel Merry weather had sensed the mercenary nature of his daughter so he outwits them in their planning. He finds a widow to marry who would look after him better. The lesson ends on a humorous note but outlines a very tragic and pathetic concern – care of the elderly that is a glaring and ugly reality of today's world.

1) The Story of My Life

Helen Keller's ideas were vague and her vocabulary was inadequate. But as she learned more and more words her field of inquiry broadened. One morning she asked Miss Sullivan the meaning of the word "love". Miss Sullivan put her arm gently round her and spelled into her hand, "I love Helen'. "What is love?" she asked. Miss Sullivan drew her closer and pointing to her heart said, "It is here". Once Helen was finding difficulty in stringing beads of different sizes. She was puzzled. Miss Sullivan touched her forehead and spelled the word with decided emphasis, "Think". In a flash Helen knew that the word was the name of the process that was going in her head. Miss Sullivan had a wonderful faculty for description. Helen was not interested in the science of numbers. But Helen learnt from life itself. When Miss Sullivan came, everything about her breathed of love and joy and full of meaning.

It was really 'a slow and often painful process' through which the deaf and blind child Helen Keller acquired the key to 'all language'. Children who can hear can acquire language without any special effort. The first word that her teacher, Miss Sullivan spelled into her hand was "d-o-l-l". In the days that followed she learned to spell many words like "pin", "hat", "cup" and a few verbs like "sit", "stand" and "walk". At that time she even didn't know that everything has a name. Then she realised that a wordless sensation was called a 'thought'. She understood that everything had a name and each name gave birth to a new thought. Miss Sullivan had taught her to find beauty in the fragrant woods and in every blade of grass. She linked Helen's earliest thought with nature. She made her feel that 'birds and flowers' and she herself were 'happy peers'.

2) The Diary of a Young Girl

The Franks left Germany to live in Holland because they felt they could escape persecution. After the Germans invaded Holland in 1940, however, the same laws imposed in Germany were extended to the Netherlands. Anne thinks the laws are unjust, but she does not completely understand why the Jewish people have been singled out for this discrimination. She wishes that next time the Jews will be chosen for something good rather than something bad. Anne feels it is unfair that Jews cannot use streetcars, that they must wear yellow stars,

and that she must attend a particular school. Nonetheless, she is still optimistic about her family's safety and feels relatively secure about her future. Anne accepts the restrictions as a fact of life in Amsterdam, and she is thankful to the Dutch people for their sympathy, especially the ferryman, who lets Jews ride the ferry because they are not allowed to ride streetcars.

Once the SS call up for Margot, Anne realises that she is not safe from the Nazis. Her entire life and worldview is quickly transformed as she is forced into hiding. As Anne hears about more of her friends being taken to concentration camps, her fears grow and she questions why the Jews are being restricted. She also questions why she remains relatively safe while her friends outside have to suffer so much. Anne says that she does not blame the Dutch people for her family's misfortune, and her sense of perspective allows her to realise that the non-Jewish Dutch also suffer greatly during the war. When she hears that the Dutch are becoming more anti-Semitic, she is disheartened but remains optimistic about humanity.
