Tourists to Jammu and Kashmir have another attraction - a floating post office on the Dal Lake in Srinagar, the first in the country. 'Floating Post Office, Dal Lake' - claimed to be the only one such post office in the world is built on an intricately carved maroon houseboat, fastened on the western edge of the Dal Lake.

This post office lets you avail of all the regular postal services available in the country while being afloat. The seal used on everything posted from Floating Post Office is unique - along with the date and address, it bears the design of a boatman rowing a Shikara on the Dal Lake. The special feature of this post office is that letters posted from here carry a special design which has the picturesque scenery of Dal Lake and Srinagar city. These pictures reach wherever these letters are posted to and hence promote Kashmir as a tourist destination across the world.

This is actually a heritage post office that has existed since British times. It was called Nehru Park Post Office before 2011. But then the chief postmaster John Samuel renamed it as "Floating Post Office'.

The post office's houseboat has two small rooms - one serves as the office and the other a small museum that traces the philatelic history of the state postal department. It has a shop that sells postage stamps and other products.

But for the locals, Floating Post office is more than an object of fascination. 1-2 crore is deposited per month in Floating Post Office by communities living in and around the Dal Lake. The lake has several islets that are home to more than 50,000 people.

The greatest fear is the recurrence of 2014 like floods in which the houseboat had gone for a toss uncontrollably pushed by the flood. Rescue teams had to anchor it using the special mechanism in a nearby highland. Then it was brought back on the Dal after the water receded. The biggest boon is that at no time of the year do you need a fan in this

post-office!





The line graph illustrates the changing trends in the numbers of students, in 1000s, who
visited Australia for education from four different countries between 1982 and 2000.
 Overall it is evident that visitor numbers from all four countries increased over the time
period.

At the start of the period, while Malaysia had around 5,000 students per year visiting Australia, the other countries had none. However, though remaining at the highest

number up until 1990 and increasing after this, visitors number from Malaysia finished at the lowest levels of all the countries, at around 18,000.

The lack of student visitors continued for Hong Kong and Singapore up until 1987. At that point arrivals from Singapore gradually increased over the years, culminating in nearly 20,000 visitors per year in 2000, while arrivals from Hong Kong showed a more erratic pattern, fluctuating after 1996 and finishing at 19,000 per year.

However, the biggest change was seen in the numbers coming from Indonesia. Though this started low, arrivals kept increasing over the years. Numbers peaked in 1998 at approximately 28,000, before dropping to final arrival numbers of 23,000, which exceeded all the other countries.

OR

The three given pie charts depict types of food consumption in 2008 as compared in two countries- India and China. In general, processed food is a major type of food eaten. Processed food comprises as high as 41% of the global consumption. In China and India as well, processed foods are consumed the most, the rate of consumption is 34% and 39% respectively. On average, vegetables and fruits constitute 29% of consumption. In China, vegetables and fruits comprise 32% of food consumption which is 9% more than that of India. For Indians, animal food accounts for 27% of their diet, exceeding Chinese food consumption by a striking 12%. However, nuts and seeds comprise almost one-fifth of Chinese food habits. This is way more than the global consumption of 4% and 11% of India. Overall, world food consumption largely comprises processed food. Chinese consumption of nuts and seeds is unbelievably higher than the average percentage.

- ii. When young, Ebright felt he could neither play football nor baseball. There was one thing which he could do, which was collecting things. He had a wonderful assortment of monarch butterflies, fossils, rocks and coins. He began collecting things when he was in kindergarten.
- iii. The hack driver made a fool of the narrator. He misguided the lawyer by taking him everywhere to find Oliver Lutkins. In fact, Bill (the hack driver), the person who was helping the lawyer find Lutkins, in the end, turned out to be Lutkins himself. He deceived the lawyer and made money. He took the lawyer to all those places where Lutkins could be found and managed quite easily to befool the lawyer.
- 12. Living in hiding, in the Secret Annex, was twice as hard for the children as the adults because they were always told to hold on to their opinions at a time when their ideas were being shattered by the mayhem of war. As a young girl growing up during the time of the most destructive war in history, seeing the worst side of human nature brought to the fore, it was next to impossible to believe that there could be such things as truth, justice or God. This is the juncture at which Anne's diary became so important in her life. Her writing had a transformative power that took everyday mundane activities and made it into amusing anecdotes, showing us how a claustrophobic space such as the Secret Annex could also be a fertile ground for creativity and imagination. Anne deftly navigated her inner and outer world, weaving them together through her contemplative stance on life, which was often undercut by her ironic interjections. Her diary not only captured her personal journey but also gave us a commentary on the social and cultural atmosphere and especially, the experience of the war from the perspective of lived reality.

Anne was indeed an intelligent girl. She was only 13 years old but her diary showed she was mature for her age. She decided to write a diary because she felt that she would be able to confide in the diary comfortably. Only an intelligent girl could think so deeply and

- wisely. Moreover, she proved the necessity of talking as she attributed her talkative nature to her inherited traits. When her teacher punished her for being too talkative, she wrote a fine poem and turned the joke on her teacher. This compelled her teacher to understand her and stop punishing her. Hence, we can conclude that she was intelligent, mature and wise beyond her age.
- 13. Mrs. Pumphrey is a very rich woman. Her dog's name is Tricki. She has a deep love and cares for her pet dog. She does not treat it like a dog, but she treats it like her own child. This can be seen throughout the story. She provides it with a luxurious life. Tricki has cushions, bed, bowls and different types of clothes. Apart from this, she overfeeds Tricki out of her love and concern. She serves him cod-liver oil and malt between the main meals and Horlicks after dinner to give him strength. She never behaved like a mature woman. She loved to have new and luxurious dresses. She liked to have jewellery. She was never satisfied. She did not follow her husband's good advice. Thus, Matilda's unrealistic dreams were the cause of her ruin. Another way could have been to try getting a job or starting a business. One should either try to work hard to realise one's dreams or stop dreaming altogether.
