CULTURAL ELEMENTS OF DIVERSITY IN INDIA ARE KEY TO BUILDING A NATIONAL IDENTITY

Jawaharlal Nehru, in his seminal work 'Discovery of India' spoke about the vibrant enigma that India is ^{because of} ~~with~~ its diversity and multiplicities. Other than him, many scholars have ^{been} time and again left enamored by India's rich diversity.

India, often addressed as the cradle of civilisation, has always considered its cultural diversity as an asset. It gives it the vibrancy and value that has now become synonymous with India. Apart from the physical diversity of its geography, it is also blessed with a flourishing cultural diversity/plurality across religion, language, region,

Ethnicity, race / colour, food habits
~~and~~ dressing preferences and
music & dance. Therefore, it
becomes important to understand
how it has effectively managed
to accommodate its diversity
over years, the difficulties faced
in doing so, the challenges ahead
and ~~the~~ its experience vis-a-vis
other nations.

RELIGION

India, is predominantly a Hindu
population state, however it has
a sizeable muslim population ~14%.
(census 2011) (2nd largest in the world
after Indonesia) and christians,
jews, parsis, Jains, Sikhs.

Soon after the gory episode
of partition, that accompanied
with itself Hindu-Muslim animosity,

it became important for India to protect its ^{religious} minorities (particularly muslims) and refrain from being called a Hindu state in response to Pakistan's muslim state hypothesis.

Therefore, India adopted a 'secular' state model based on positive relation between religion and state. (Art 25). This model has not only survived all certain cases of through these years and through inter religious conflicts and ethno-centrism but has time and again re-strengthened itself.

This is in contrast to the ~~divisive model of erstwhile Pakistan, who couldn't accomodate its~~ This is in contrast to the divisive model of Sri Lanka that couldn't recognise the Tamil minority and gave undue advantage to Buddhism and their language, Singhalese which eventually led to a civil war.

Although, ~~certain skirmishes like~~
Although, certain incidents like
Dadri lynching, Godhra riots,
Ayodhya case continue to
disturb the socio-religious
fabric of India, adequate steps
must be taken care to ensure
that majoritarian feeling of
syncretism is not overpowered
by minoritarian led fundamentalism
and communalism. → Many instances of harmonious
relations can be seen -
i.e. when a Muslim girl
wins a Bhagwat Geeta
recitation competition

LANGUAGE

The Indian state officially
recognises 22 languages in the
Eight Schedule of the constitution.
However, there are many other
local languages, dialects in India
apart from these 22. This
shows the linguistic plurality
present in India.

The major conflict
regarding language and linguistic

identity came to fore soon after independence when southern states like Andhra Pradesh demanded division of states on linguistic lines. Soon after, the State Reorganisation Commission was set up which divided India on linguistic lines into 14 states.

Soon after this, the question of national language arose, with particular aggression from the southern non-hindi speaking states. Therefore, it was decided that both Hindi and English would continue to be India's official language.

Both these incidents show remarkable maturity on the part of our leaders in handling such emotive issues with objectivity and thereby protecting India's national identity integrity. Further, it is not a rare sight to see a Punjabi from southern India talking in Tamil. This spirit of 'Unity in diversity' is also the hallmark

A stark comparison can be drawn with Pakistan, that was not able to accommodate its Bengali population that drew differences with its Urdu speaking population. This eventually led to its Partition in 1971 into Pakistan and Bangladesh.

ETHNICITY & TRIBAL POPULATION

India's biggest strength perhaps lie in how it has assimilated and integrated its native ethnic ~~pe~~ and tribal population through constitutional instruments like Art 15, 16, 46, schedule 5 and 6, PESA.

The Indian state has taken cognizance of their distinct habitate and culture and given them considerable financial, administrative autonomy and aided their development through protective discrimination.

This is in stark contrast to the treatment meted out by Burmese authorities on Rohingyas in the Rakhine state of Myanmar leading to gross human rights violation. & 'ethnic cleansing'

And although, certain instances like the Mass exodus of N.E. civilians from Bangalore couple of years ago and derogatory remarks such as 'chinki, chinese' pose a threat to our ethnic minorities, care has been taken by the state to reprimand such actions.

DRESSING AND FOOD HABITS

From ~~the~~ Southern Kanchipuram, to Assamese silk, to Rajasthan's Chikankari - the Indian textiles weave a story of their place of origin and culture. Further, there are no laid down statutory restrictions when it comes to one's choice of dress. However, ~~this~~ right

such ~~act~~ values of liberalism are absent in countries like France (Recent Burqa Ban) and Saudi Arabia (where every woman must cover head).

A Recent episode of daderi lynching might pose a threat to the freedom of one's dietary habits, however, it must be remembered that it is the work of certain vigilante groups and that the state strongly condemns it.

Through westernisation, modernisation and globalisation, a new cosmopolitan culture is emerging particularly in Indian societies. The Indian society has adapted to these changes and also led to traditionisation of modernity.

Therefore, it can be seen that although India has a rich cultural plurality of religion, language, ethnicity etc, they all get subsumed under their national identity and have in fact played a key role in enriching it and adding to India's soft power and hence, they are key to the process of national identity. India's strength therefore, lies in its 'UNITY IN DIVERSITY'.

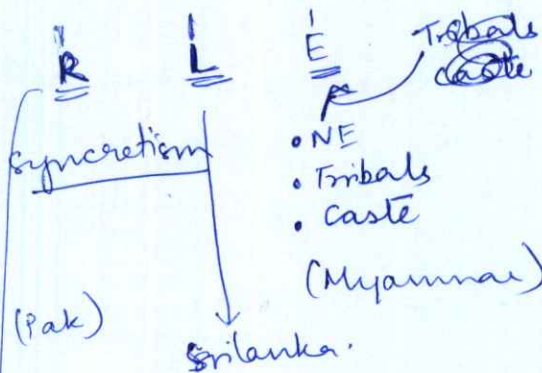
