Reach for the Top

On Killing a Tree - Thinking about the Poem

Q. 1 Can a “simple jab of the knife” kill a tree? Why not?

Ans.: No, a simple jab of the knife cannot kill a tree because a tree takes countless years to grow and rise out of the earth’s surface. Its roots go on curling inside the cave of the deep earth which are well protected by absorbing years of sunlight, air and water. Therefore, a jab of the knife won’t be enough as the tree would rise again to its former size.

Q.2 How has the tree grown to its full size? List the words suggestive of its life and activity.

Ans.: The tree has slowly grown out of the earth’s surface to its full size and sprouted leaves by ingesting years of sunlight, air and water

The following words are suggestive of its life and activity:

- grown slowly consuming the earth
- rising out of it
- feeding upon its crust
- absorbing years of sunlight, air and water
- out of its leprous hide sprouting leaves

Q.3 What is the meaning of “bleeding bark”? What makes it bleed?

Ans.; "Bleeding Bark" here refers to the cutting of the tree with heavy and unbearable blows i.e. the axe. The continuous and rough blows of an axe by the wood cutter make the tree bleed.

Q. 4 The poet says "No" in the beginning of the third stanza. What does he mean by this?

Ans.: The word 'No' tends to provide a shift in the argument offered where the poet makes an attempt to lay emphasis on the fact that merely cutting a tree would not kill it. Its roots are deep seated inside the earth's surface which protect the tree and slowly help it in coming back to its original size.

Q.5 What is the meaning of "anchoring earth" and "earth care"?

Ans.: 'Anchoring earth' refers to the roots of the tree that are deep seated inside the earth's surface and play the most pivotal role in the healthy growth and nourishment of the tree by supplying it with water and nutrients. "Earth care" refers to the surface of the ground on which the basic structure of the tree is laid. It performs the significant function of holding the tree and helping it withstand different conditions of natural calamities.

Q.6 What does he mean by "the strength of the tree exposed"?

Ans.: The real power of a tree lies deep inside the earth's surface i.e. in the roots. The poet, therefore, suggests for a complete snapping of these in order to kill a tree. 'the strength of the tree exposed' is used by the poet in this context to signify the situation where the roots of the tree are completely pulled out of the earth and left exposed.

Q.7 What finally kills the tree?

Ans.: The tree is finally killed after its roots have been completely plucked out of the earth's surface with the help of rough and unbearable blows of an axe. Thus, its strength is eventually exposed which culminates in the death of the tree. Furthermore, the withering, browning and hardening of the matter left in the sun and air completely dries up its roots as well as its foundations.

Ans.: When Santosh turned sixteen, she was pressurized for marriage. However, she threatened her parents that she would never marry if she did not get a proper education. It was then that she left home and got herself enrolled in a school in Delhi.

Q.1E Answer these questions in one or two sentences each. (The paragraph numbers within brackets provide clues to the answers) Why did Santosh's parents agree to pay for her schooling in Delhi? What mental qualities of Santosh are brought into light by this incident? (Para 4)

Ans.: When Santosh's parents refused to pay for her schooling in Delhi, she informed them of her alternate plans of working part time in order to pay for her school fees. Then, eventually, her parents agreed to pay for her education. This incident portrays that Santosh was a mentally strong person who was not only determined towards working hard but also had the courage to challenge the norms of the society bravely.

Q. 2 A Answer each of these questions in a short paragraph (or about 30 words). How did Santosh begin to climb mountains?

Answer :

Santosh often observed the villagers going up the Aravalli Hills and then vanishing after a while from her room in Kasturba Hostel. However, on investigating regarding the truth behind it, she found only a few mountaineers and asked if she could join them.
