You remain committed to a life of goodness and action. But, you also recognize that there are

other bigger forces, of immense scale, in play in the grand scheme of things and it'll do you much good to play along.

- 4. You gain this courage, zest and zeal to work hard, to excel, to serve. Life looks beautiful and everything looks priceless then because it truly is. Even our suffering is priceless. It gives you strength, it makes you reflect on you. It is priceless because you appreciate life more, it brings you closer to you, the real you. It has been compared to a set of intricately carved Chinese workboxes: within each opened box lies another, similar. Even today, when the Forbidden City is open to western eyes it retains a sense of mystery. Just as it is impossible to know exactly what may be hidden within a given box, so many of the secrets of Beijing's stately place complex may never be revealed.

The building of the Forbidden City was undertaken by the third Ming emperor, Young Lo, who ruled between 1403 and 1423 after he had finally ousted the Mongols from Beijing. An estimated workforce of 100000 craftsmen and a million labourers set to work, fashioning the city's 800 palaces, 75 halls, numerous temples, pavilions, libraries, and studios, all linked by gardens, courtyards, and pathways: in the city, which from its inception was forbidden to outsiders, 24 emperors of the Ming and Qing dynasties reigned, shielded behind a moat and a wall 35 ft high-until the republican revolution begin in 1911.

The Forbidden City is an architectural masterpiece whose beauty lays not so much in any one building as in the ordered layout of the whole and the exquisite combination of colours used in its decoration. Altogether, it reflects the Chinese view that the emperor was the son too. Heaven was the mediator responsible for order and harmony on earth. The formal entrance to the city is the Meridian Gate, where a drum and bell were sounded whenever an emperor passed by. The vast courtyard beyond the gate contains a section of the Golden River. Shaped like an archer's bow and spanned by five marble bridges, it leads to the Gate of supreme Harmony-deemed centre of the Chinese world. In this splendid chamber, the emperor presided over the Dragon Throne and grand ceremonies were held on festive occasions. Behind it stand the Hall of Complete Harmony, where the emperor prepared for audiences with envoys from abroad. No emperor ventured from the Forbidden City at all if he could avoid it. He entertained visitors in the most northerly of the three-state imperial buildings, the Hall of Preserving

Harmony.

North of these halls and repeating their layout is a group of three places that comprise the imperial residential quarters. Two of these, the place of Heavenly Purity and the Place of Earthly Tranquillity, were the residences of the emperor and empress respectively. Between them, lie the Hall of Union, symbolically uniting the emperor and empress, Heaven and Earth, young and yin, male and female. Beyond the places lie the imperial gardens, where pools, rockeries, temples, libraries, theatres, pavilions, and pine, and cypress trees complement the symmetry of the buildings.

- I. Good decoration reflects the personality of the people who live in the home. It should, first of all, be distinctive, just as each person is distinctive. A home should have unity not only within each room but also throughout the house. Rooms should, to some degree, harmonize with each other. The colour and styling of each room, particularly, should fit into the colour and styling of the rooms which run out of it.
- II. Attractive home furnishings set the stage for pleasant living. If they are an expression of yourself, you will have a feeling of satisfaction every time you enter your home, and friends will share your enjoyment.
- III. However, furnishings and surroundings expressive of just the right note of restfulness, gay informality, or elegant simplicity are not often assembled by accident. Even enthusiasm alone is not enough. For most home decorators, it takes poring over plans, trying colour schemes, finding ingenious ways to make the best of what you have, and shopping around to search out just the right purchases at prices you can afford to pay. But there is keen pleasure in striving for the perfect result, and great satisfaction in achieving it.
- IV. A successful house and successful rooms will depend upon the proper relationship of each element in it to the others and to the whole. Therefore, in selecting each piece it is well to consider the background, the usage, the draperies, the floor covering, the upholstering materials, the woods, shapes, colour scheme, and the "feeling" you prefer for the room.
- V. Work and plan to enjoy your house. Limit the expenditures of time, effort and money to the extent of your abilities, so that just running the house doesn't dominate your life. Elegance and delicate things may be a drain you can afford only in a limited way. If you can't afford outside help, select a house and furnishings that require less care. Plan your activities so that tumult and upset are limited to a few rooms— an activity room or a bedroom, or a corner of the dining room.
- VI. You'll get more pleasure out of a house if you have a hobby connected with it—collecting glass or antiques, gardening or indoor flower growing ceramics, art, cooking, decorating, flower arrangements, etc. And you'll get more satisfaction and a great deal of help from studying household activities.
- VII. You can select a pleasing combination of colours from a wallpaper, a fabric, an oriental rug, a flower or scene, or even a picture in a magazine. If you don't already have the furniture or rugs, it is a good idea to make up a colour scheme in this way.

Let one colour predominate. Limit a colour scheme to two or three colours, with white or grey tones. These points will help you: (1) Always choose colours that please you personally—subtle, calm colours if you prefer a restful atmosphere, intense colours if you like liveliness and cheer. (2) Don't be afraid of colour. Experimenting on paper will give you confidence. (But remember larger batches of colour are more intense.) Try out various colour combinations, then live with them—look at them frequently before you actually start buying. (3) Colours should harmonize with furniture, draperies, carpets.


