Sir,

I have just returned from a tour of / the flood affected areas in Bihar, [¼] where unprecedented havoc and destruction have taken place.

No doubt people are / already familiar with the terrible tragedy that [½] has overtaken Bihar, but the account of an eye witness will bring / home to the people with all the greater effect the terrible distress which these disastrous floods have caused. In // some places whole villages have been swept away and the crops over a large area destroyed. Thousand of villagers / [1¼] have been rendered destitute, most of them have nothing but the clothes in which they managed to escape somehow /.
